Lesson-08 Study Guide: Tried and True

Lesson Focus Passage: Daniel 6

Background: Darius the Mede (<u>Daniel 5:31</u>) may have been a governor appointed by **Cyrus**, ruler of the Persian Empire, to rule over conquered Babylon, or it could be another name for Cyrus himself.

In any case, Persia conquered Babylon in October, 539 B.C., and Cyrus' first year is dated as beginning the following March, 538 B.C.

There is no mention of a "Darius the Mede" in any historical texts relating to the period. However, it should be remembered that up until the 19th century there was no historical record outside the Bible of a "Belshazzar" either (Daniel 5:1).

When cuneiform tables from the Persian period were deciphered, Belshazzar was found to be a historical figure. Archaeology always eventually verifies the historical accounts in Scripture, and will eventually do so in the case of Darius as well.

Preparatory Questions

- 1. From our study so far, how are the attributes listed in Psalm 15:1-5 reflected in Daniel's life?
- 2. Why does God not always bring peace in the lives of His saints even when their ways please Him? (see James 1:3-4)
 - a. In Daniel's case, what purposes were likely higher priorities for God than just the safety of Daniel?
 - b. What priority should personal safety (deliverance) play as a motivating factor in obeying and pleasing the Lord?
